Committee Comments

Well, I wonder if we have had our "Summer" for this year? I have to say that I hope I'm wrong and that by the time this edition of the Villages' News is delivered we will be enjoying glorious, sunny weather, with the rain showers arriving at night to cut down on the watering. I can dream!!

Following the results of the Big Butterfly Count 2024, Butterfly Conservation have declared a butterfly emergency and need our help more than ever before.

The Big Butterfly Count for 2025 begins on July 18th through to August 10th. Each survey takes 15 minutes, and you can undertake it anywhere, during bright (preferably sunny) weather. Record your results by going to: Big Butterfly Count. The Count is fun for everyone and is a chance to improve identification skills of these important creatures. If you have a smart phone the results can be recorded via an App.

This Spring may have provided better conditions for the butterflies and bees. I certainly saw many more butterflies: from the tiny Holly Blues to the beautiful yellow Brimstones. In St Mary's church in Beenham we rescued many more Peacock butterflies this year (they overwinter as adults).

On two recent walks (one along the Kennet tow path) we were fortunate to spot several "nests" of Peacock caterpillars on nettles. This is something I haven't seen for many years and bodes well for this species, this year.

So, get or download an identification chart and get out into our beautiful local countryside and see what you can spot! Have fun!

Hello to you from Greyfield Wood!

As promised the "big fell" has been completed with a large proportion of the diseased Ash and Mature Spruce having been felled and cut into appropriate lengths for processing. By the time you read this, those lengths of log will have been stored in the loading area, or just off the bridle path by the loading area. There is a lot of wood. What happens to it? The Ash will be processed for fire logs. The Spruce



that is not too wide or too small a diameter will be processed and most likely become fence posts. The rest will become chipwood and used in the production of chipboard. Spruce chipboard, a versatile building material, is commonly used in construction for floors, walls, and roofs. Additionally, Spruce chipboard finds applications in packaging, joinery, and even for temporary buildings.

Once the wood has been cleared of the cut logs, the brushings and other debris from the felling will be scraped to create dead hedges. This will ensure that the felled areas are clear, ready to be prepared for planting in the winter. We will also be working with this debris to create cordwood to be sold locally.

So, our sturdy band of volunteers will have much to do in the coming months as we prepare for planting, when we will see the appearance of our lovely wood change again.

If you would like to join our group of volunteers please contact me. You are not expected to be there every week, just come when you are able. Every small activity in the wood helps.



Mikron Theatre

The annual visit from the Mikron Theatre has yet to be advertised but it is on 16th and 23rd July. Shows normally start at 7pm in the Rowbarge grounds. If you've not been before, this is an event not to be missed. Always topical, often irreverent, often hilarious, sometimes controversial, the cast (who travel around on a barge) are very entertaining. You are advised to bring your own seating as there are limited arrangements at the Rowbarge. Entry is free but donations are gratefully received to help fund the event.

Our Station - Brunel to Beeching

In 1840 the railway from London reached Reading and continued the 120 miles to Bristol. During 1846 there were indications of the need for a further extension westward from Reading. The necessary Bill was passed, and Isambard Kingdom Brunel prepared to lay the track to Hungerford via Woolhampton. During October 1847 the extension had



reached Thatcham Marsh aided by 'Jack of Newbury' which when "put to work moved 150 tons of earth with ease by means of 32 trucks attached to it". In December the engine 'Phoenix' left Newbury station for a trial run with a Government inspector on board. It was decided that the line would open on Tuesday 21st December 1847 with the proposal that five trains would run daily each way. On midday on the appointed date the first train down to Hungerford left Newbury under watchful eyes of 700 spectators. The cost was reported at £20,000 per mile. The station at Woolhampton designed by Archibald Bertram was built on peat land owned by Charles Frankum for which he received £600 compensation and Lord Falmouth received £2,000 for his loss of land. The station was renamed Midgham in 1873 "because too many mistakes kept arriving because of confusion with Wolverhampton". (There was a 'story' that Queen Victoria's horses were despatched for a Wolverhampton race meeting …) Charles Abbott was the first station master and lived at 'Clock House' as, until 1915, did his successors.

The station was a boon to dairy farmers, osier growers, local gentry and the yard's coal pens supplied Henry Naylor, coal merchant in Station Road. The railway would have been an added attraction for squires Blyth and Green when purchasing the Woolhampton and Midgham estates.

The enthusiasm for railways continued and in 1880 agreement was reached between the Didcot, Newbury Junction Railway Company and William Mount for the line of the proposed railway from Southampton to pass through his estate to Aldermaston via Brimpton with a station at Shalford Bridge. In the event the line was not built for commercial reasons.

In 1960 Dr Richard Beeching was appointed Chairman of British Rail and his report led to the removal of 2,000, mostly rural, station buildings. Aldermaston was the first of our local stations to be demolished followed by Midgham at the hands of 'Bow Bells' of London who transported the lead to local traders. There followed a reduction in rail services and much protest from local users.


Celebrating in style



Our group continues to grow from strength to strength. To ensure we continue to develop, we need to expand the number of volunteers within the group. Squirrels and Cubs being the priority.



Aldermaston Parish Council - 10th June 2025

The Open Forum was dominated by discussion of the incident in which a 2-year-old child was hit by a car outside Aldermaston C.E. Primary School in Wasing Lane. Fortunately, the child was not seriously injured. The school passed a site safety inspection by West Berks, who promptly arrived at the scene, although they recommended that the crossing should be moved to stop children having access to the busy road. Meantime the parents have been asked to complete a questionnaire expressing their views. You can rest assured that the Parish Council will take this incident into consideration as we strive to reduce speeding traffic in the area.

On the Planning front, unusually we were faced with no new applications, though we are expecting one from Young's Industrial Estate, Paices Hill.

Since our last meeting, WBC has made three planning decisions affecting us. They have approved the application for the detailed design of the new industrial estate at Blacks Lake, Paices Hill, and also the conditions associated with the establishment of eight permanent pitches in lieu of eight transit pitches at the Travellers' Site on Paices Hill, but not the Emergency Plan. They have decided that a planning application for the agricultural barn at Padworth Park is not required. The Parish Council had objected to the application for the conversion of the Travellers' Site on the grounds of lack of space for permanent pitches and to the Blacks Lake application, as it bore little resemblance to the original application.

We congratulated the Clerk on her good internal audit report and agreed to her request for the provision of new software to complete the accounts.

We reviewed the RoSPA report on the state of the play equipment at the Recreation Ground and we will ensure its users remain safe.

Work continues on the provision of a new defibrillator at the Parish Hall, and we reached agreement on the wording of a draft contract specifying the respective responsibilities of the Parish Council and the Management Committee of the Parish Hall.

We have taken out new insurance with Clear Councils, who are well established. We were previously with Zurich, but they were late responding to our request to renew our policy.

Under AOB, the subjects raised included Wray's Farm and Church Farm and the impact on local roads of a Traveller's funeral on 11th June at the Village Church.

We continue to monitor HGVs using Church Road, and as a result three lorry drivers have been prosecuted.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday 8th July 2025 at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall. As usual, your presence is welcomed!

ALDERMASTON CE PRIMARY SCHOOL

We have enjoyed having some visitors into school; Owls class had a virtual workshop with poet James Carter. He helped the class to write their own kennings – these are poems like riddles which describe something without ever saying what it is. In a few weeks, the whole school will meet James when he comes to hold a whole school assembly.

Visitors came from the outreach programme from the Museum of English Rural Life to run some class workshops about the rich history and community experiences of our Gypsy, Romany and Traveller communities. They brought with them a treasure trove of artefacts from the museum's collection for the children to explore. The children were fascinated by these sources of historical



evidence and the care taken to preserve them for future generations.

XTRAC is a local company supplying gearboxes for motorsports around the world. We were fortunate to book them to run small group workshops with all our KS2 children. Every child in Owls, Kingfishers and Starlings enjoyed finding out more about the fundamental concepts involved in making and using gears. They discussed real life examples and took part in a collaborative activity working to assemble individual gearboxes guided by STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths) ambassadors. This is a wonderful opportunity for children to develop those important STEM skills whilst also understanding how their learning can be applied in the world of work.

Distance: 2.5 miles / 4 km Duration: Approx. 1 hour 30 mins Difficulty: Easy (shorter route available)

Terrain: Footpaths, paved roads, grassy fields, and a footbridge with steps. Some muddy sections in wet weather. Dog Friendly: Dogs on short leads welcome on the walk, gardens, and orchard. Only assistance dogs inside the chapel and exhibition. Accessibility: Uneven paths and slopes make the full walk challenging for some, but a shorter paved alternative is available.

Walk Directions:

1. Begin at the Chapel

Admire Spencer's murals inside the chapel before starting the trail. **Open Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Bank Holiday Monday from 11am – 3pm. Further details: Sandham Memorial Chapel Details**

2. Cross the Railway Bridge

Turn left outside the chapel. Cross the brick-bordered bridge over the old railway. Take the first left down Pound Lane. Spot Sandham House (second on the right).

3. Ox Drove Track

Continue to the end of Pound Lane, curving onto the Ox Drove. Walk straight for 100 yards until a kissing gate appears on your right.

4. Footpath to Church

Go through the gate and follow the tree-lined path across fields to the Church of the Ascension.

5. Route Options

- Shorter Route: Exit churchyard via the main gate onto Harts Lane. Turn left to return to the chapel.
- Full Trail: Exit near the war memorial. Follow the path behind the church, through fields and gates, down Jacob's Ladder, and over the footbridge. Arrive at Spring Lane.

6. Old Station House

Return up Spring Lane. See Old Station House on your left.

7. Return to Chapel

Turn left at the top, cross the bridge, and finish your walk back at the chapel.
