Brimpton Parish Council

The agenda included for our July meeting included:

Environment

Thames Water has replied to our questions regarding the future use of the sewage pumping station and the measures they were intending to take to prevent further winter flooding. It was a long reply but in essence they said:

- a) the chamber was inspected last winter but they are going to carry out additional inspections of the "wet well" during the next winter to identify any specific points where groundwater may be getting into the chamber and causing it to flood.
- b) they will explore the possibility of a full catchment survey to allow for a more comprehensive investigation of the local network.
- c) there will not be a target date for any remedial work until they have a clearer picture of what needs to be done to solve problem (if they can confirm one exists).
- d) they will restore the verges and repair the damage caused by tankers outside of the pumping station and will take up dangerous parking with their logistics team who monitor the tanker drivers.
- e) the cost of the "tankering" (their word) operation between January 2024 and February 2025 was £220,730.

We will monitor whether these actions are delivered and have asked Thames Water for a timeline for repairs to the verges in Brimpton Road.

Highways

Repairs have been underway for the past two weeks at the bridge between the Baptist Church and King's Bridge in Brimpton Road. The parapet was damaged last year in an accident and the brickwork has now been replaced.

Planning

There were no new planning applications to consider.

Regarding the development at Hillcourt Lodge, plus construction of a mobile home on site, Cllr Dominic Boeck reported on his discussion of residents' complaints with the WBC head of planning and explained the reasons why these buildings have been allowed to proceed without planning applications. We recognised the legal position but felt it was regrettable that the new owners had not explained their proposals to neighbouring residents.

The Parish Council will meet again on **Tuesday 5th August**, starting at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. All are welcome to attend and residents may raise issues in the Open Forum that are not otherwise listed on the agenda. Brimpton WI

It's been a busy but enjoyable few weeks at Brimpton WI.

On 10 July 40 members and partners met at Manor Farm for what has now turned into an Annual BBQ. The weather was very hot, and we were all pleased when the sun went behind the trees and it felt cooler. The salads and dessert were provided by committee members, and two husbands kindly did the cooking of burgers and sausages. The main topic of conversation during the evening was that at last year's BBQ it was so cold, everyone was wrapped up in puffer jackets and blankets!!!

At our Summer Outing on 15 July, 16 members gathered at Blue Beetle Pottery in Thatcham. As usual with any WI event that was a lot of chatter over coffee to start with. Lorna soon got us under control and guided us through the process of painting a bowl with a 'peacock feather' effect. There were lots of examples for us to get ideas from which we all found very helpful.

Using a medium called flux, the first step was to paint a series of 'U's' around the top edge Inside the bowl followed by another row beneath. Using three different coloured paints blobs were painted inside each of the 'U' shapes and another row of blobs underneath. We then had a sponge to colour around the rim and the top of the outside the bowl. If wished more blobs could be added to this painted area. Once all the paint was dry, the whole bowl was coated with a glaze containing tiny pieces of crystal.

At this stage the bowl looked a lumpy grey mess, so we really look forward to seeing the results of our efforts in a week or two after they have been fired in the kiln. It was a fun experience, and I am sure many of us will revisit to have another go.

Hugh Attwood – Baskets, Boer War and D-Day



Hugh Attwood was born in 1844 in the Wiltshire village of Biddestone sited between Chippenham and Bath. His father had reason to re-marry and the resulting domestic strain caused two brothers to emigrate to Australia and Hugh to set off on the 50 mile walk to Woolhampton to the home of Uncle Will Attwood, basket maker, grocer and landlord of the 'Rose & Crown' (sign still visible on wall of 'Crown House', Station Road). In later years, now a family man, Hugh and wife Sarah-Marie, occupied one of the 'Swing Bridge Cottages' opposite the 'Row Barge' inn. Described as "five tenements under one roof with gardens home to five families" — alongside the canal as in photograph. In 1881 Hugh and 8 children occupied two of the cottages. By 1891 there were three additional children (three older children no longer at home). Hugh purchased the two cottages in estate sale of 1902. In later years it was noted that the cottage beams were of poplar or willow and the floors lined with osier peelings as Insulation.

Hugh was described in 1899 as basket maker and dairy farmer with cattle pens in the garden and a milk round (Sarah-Marie, amazingly, found the energy to go 'stone picking' in the fields). Baskets were widely used in vegetable gardens, orchards, by bakers, in laundries, post offices, pigeon fanciers, households, providing measures — a 'pottle' gave ½ a gallon of strawberries. Hugh's baskets were used in the water cress beds at Stanford Dingley. On market day members of the family walked to Newbury with baskets for sale some balanced on heads. Hugh was a staunch member of the Congregational Chapel and in 1895 became a member of the inaugural Woolhampton Parish Council. Second son Albert served in the Boer War. Youngest sons Frank and Alfred served the village. Frank was a basket maker who inherited his father's milk round (delivered by bicycle with churn on handlebars!) and Alfred as blacksmith in present 'Old Forge', Station Road, and village cricket captain. In 1936 Frank erected a modern house 'Kennet Side' close to the old family cottages, becoming in more recent years the home of his son Ray who died in 2015 aged 95 years — recently replaced by Poplar Lodge. He too served his country and in 1944 was part of the D-Day landing, serving in proximity to Sir William Mount of Wasing.

Hugh died in 1924, a floral tribute from eldest daughter read "Louisa and family – Vancouver".



Aldermaston Parish Council - 8th July 2025

To start with the good news, Easy Concrete's appeal has been dismissed, so we will not have the prospect of several vehicles exiting from the site on Paices Hill onto the A340. The Parish Council will endeavour to reduce the impact of the site. This discussion dominated the Open Forum.

On the planning front there were seven applications for review, three of which had already been determined by West Berks, and three affecting Young's Industrial Estate. We were unable to make a decision on these applications, due to apparent lack of emergency plan, so we decided to object. The remaining application was from Sascron, in which they resubmitted their plans for a retrospective new building, which was refused last time by West Berks. We are sympathetic to their cause and wish to help them. We didn't comment on the application.

As well as the three listed above, largely dealing with tree works, West Berks has made five decisions. They have approved the construction of industrial units at Young's. At Burnt Pine, Reading Road, they have approved details for the construction of a replacement dwelling. They have approved the details of new units at Blacks Lake. They have also approved a new scaffolding yard at Young's Industrial Estate, which we will legally challenge, but as previously mentioned they dismissed the appeal of Easy Concrete.

There was discussion on traffic calming measures outside the school, following an injury to a child reported last month. There have also been horses on the cycle path, and we rely on the general public to report further instances to us. There has been a MITIE litter pick, courtesy of AWE, and their findings included evidence of anti-social behaviour. We also discussed an extension to the footpath in Church Road from the east of the Manor House grounds. The pavement there has become badly damaged by vegetation.

We agreed an extension to the Parish Clerk's hours, because of an increase in her amount of work.

Lastly, we agreed allocation of work on the Recreation Ground, following the RoSPA report.

Under AOB, the subjects raised included Alison Faulkner's departure for pastures new, which means that August will be her last meeting.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday 12th August 2025 at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall. As usual, your presence is welcomed!

ALDERMASTON CE PRIMARY SCHOOL



There is no update from WBC regarding the school bus parking dangerously on the corner of Stoneyfield.

Update on the new library scheme and payment for a stock of books was postponed to the next meeting as our District Councillor did not attend.

Update on the Affordable Housing initiative. The PC is awaiting a response from WBC to identify all possible preferred sites. Dominic Boeck, District Councillor, to be asked to assist with this.

The proposal for West Berkshire Council to merge with South Oxfordshire and Vale of the White Horse councils to create a new unitary authority under announced Government plans was explained.

Community Room/School Hall security is to be monitored as some hirers are not locking up properly. This may improve when the new doors and locks are in place in September.

ROSPA report on the play area on the Rec. The rope swing put up without permission to be removed on safety grounds (it has now been removed).

Maps of the footpaths and walks around Beenham have been produced. Permission to be sought to pin these onto the village Facebook pages.

A parishioner has requested permission to put a bench on the grassed area of Stoneyfield. As the PC does not own that land, permission will be sought from WBC.

25/00933/FUL Norbek, Bath Road: 4 new terraced houses following demolition of existing bungalow. The PC will object to this application on the grounds of over development of the site and subsequent increase in traffic.

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
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
