Greyfield Wood Update

There has been a lot of activity in Greyfield Wood in the past month. The main

felling of Ash dieback trees in Upper Withy Copse is now complete for this year. Our attention has now moved to the area towards Eight Acre Gulley, where The Penley Bridge crosses the Bourne. Chris Penley was the driving force behind the Greyfield Wood initiative over twenty-five years ago. The bridge and a marked tree serve as a memorial to him and his work in the wood. The photo was taken at the time of the tree planting some years ago.



This area is now being cleared of brambles and a fallen Wild Cherry

logged. With this work you can expect to see a proliferation of bluebells in the next month or so......Please have a walk down to the bridge and sit a while on the bench nearby and enjoy the tranquility.

The other key task at present is coppicing the hazel. This is where the hazel branches are cut near to the ground to generate new growth. The coppiced trees are then protected with parts of the cut hazel, against deer trying to eat any new shoots. The rest of the cut branches are sorted and sold for: firewood, pea sticks, bean poles. Hazel is also good for walking sticks!

In the last month we have also held two Volunteer "on- boarding" sessions and six new volunteers are now appraised of the work that is being done and the health and safety requirements. More sessions are being planned. Contact John on 07818 400440 for more information.

NOTES FROM THE BEENHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - 4th MARCH 2024 PUBLIC FORUM

A parishioner reported there was a trip hazard on the kerb just outside the school gates in the dark. He suggested that a light should be provided.

The Victory all Hall is finalising the work required to the roof of the building. The PC was asked to support their application for funds, the PC said they would support and contribute to the cost.

A parishioner reported that there is a full list of defibrillators (some inside homes) on the web at https://www.defibfinder.uk/. A refresher course in the use of defibrillators was suggested.

PLANNING - There were no planning applications in February.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

David Hancock attended a webcast on community-led housing to build small numbers of social housing in villages. There is a government fund to assist in these schemes.

OTHER MATTERS

An application has been submitted to British Heart Foundation for a defibrillator near the footbridge on Mallard Way.

WBC have agreed to carry out remedial work on the track between the Rec and Clay Lane.

Some volunteers have offered to carry out drainage work on the problem area on the footpath from Wickens Corner to the Church (caused by the current high water table). The PC is liaising with WBC to expedite this work.

FINANCE

It is likely that there will be a surplus at the end of the financial year.

A grant of £1,000 to WBC libraries was agreed..

A grant of £2,000 was agreed to Beenham PTFA for IT Equipment in the school, on the understanding that this would be match-funding from other sources.

A grant of £2,000 was provisionally agreed to The Victory Hall for roof repairs known. The next Parish Council meeting will be held in the Community Room on Monday 8th April, starting at 7.00pm. All parishioners are welcome to attend.

The Annual Parish Assembly will be held on Monday 11th March at 7pm.

Brimpton Parish Council

The Parish Council met on **Tuesday 5th March.** The items we discussed included:

West Berkshire Council has sought clarification of some aspects of the planning application for a change of use of the Three Horse Shoes. We agreed to support the amended application and to ask that a decision is made quickly as the building is deteriorating and the site is an eye sore in the centre of the village.

We had no objections to a proposal to build an oak framed garden room at West Lodge, Crookham Common Road.

We understand that given the number of objections from residents, as well as those from the Parish Council and AWE, the planning application for change of use on one plot in Blacknest Field is likely to be referred to the East Area Planning Committee for a decision.

After the Land Agent for the Wasing Estate intervened with the management company, work is underway to plant new screening around the solar farm.

We agreed to an application from the Parochial Church Council requesting £2000 towards the grass cutting in the church yards in the coming year.

At the rear of the Village Hall, a pedestrian gate has been installed to enable access to Jubilee Green from the public footpath. This crosses land owned by the Wasing Estate by whose permission access has been allowed. It is not an extension to the public footpath.

Brimpton Road between Willow Wands and the Baptist Church is flooded again after heavy rain. As we have been told WBC Highways Department is inundated at the moment (like the rest of us), there is likely to be a delay to the promised remedial work.

The organisers of the Brimpton commemoration of the 80th Anniversary of D-Day will be holding three social events. There will be a beacon lighting on Thursday 6th June which will include a Fish and Chip Supper. A Family Picnic with musical entertainment will be held on Saturday afternoon 8th June from 1 to 4pm. There will also be a BBQ with live music on Saturday evening. Further details in due course.

We agreed the 2024 Annual Parish Assembly will take place on Thursday 23rd May. This is not a Parish Council meeting, although by custom the Chairman of the Parish Council also chairs the Assembly. Groups and organisations who are based in Brimpton or play a part in the life of the community will be invited to talk about their activities and their plans for the coming year. The Assembly will begin at 7.30pm in the Village Hall and will be followed by refreshments and an opportunity to meet other residents.

The Parish Council will meet again on **Tuesday 2nd April**. All residents are welcome to attend the meeting which starts at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

Brook House & 'Old' Forge

During the 1820s John Appleton (a London merchant) left the city for rural Woolhampton and resided at the present 'Brooklawn', with its necessary stables and chaise house, alongside the busy Great Bath Road and the stage coaches that conveyed the wealthy to the health resort of Bath. In 1829 John built a new property, the present 'Brook House', with a shop adjacent to his residence. (Charles Frankum at the now 'Old Bakery', the builder in 1820 of Woolhampton Mill, alleged that it obstructed his light.) Nevertheless Henry Martin was a tailor trading in the new shop

in 1830. In the same year the former London merchant built a pair of cottages with a detached shop in Station Road. A Thomas Dopson was working at one of those cottages which became the forge in the 1850s; a successor was Tommy Shuttle from the 1880s until 1922, responsible for the remains of the original sign visible on side of the building representing the 'Worshipful Company of



Farriers'. His successor was Alf Attwood, the last of the village farriers. In addition to shoeing horses, repairing tools, fitting metal rims to farm wagons, making gates for the Abbey he was cricket captain, church warden and member of the Choral Society. 'Brookside Cottage', next door to the Forge, became the home of former soldier, Thomas Hawkins, a veteran of the Crimean War and the Indian Mutiny. It was from here on Saturday 12th February 1912 that Thomas finally left his home placed on a gun carriage draped in a Union Flag escorted by members of the Royal Berkshire Regiment to be honoured by a military funeral. The march to St Peter's church, Woolhampton, was led by the Aldermaston Company of Territorials with the Newbury Brass Band very much in evidence. There were said to be over a 1,000 people present at St Peter's.

ALDERMASTON CE PRIMARY SCHOOL





Aldermaston Parish Council- 12th March 2024

In Open Forum we received a presentation from Karen Dignan and Cynthia Newman, who are leading the plans for the D-Day celebrations (Thursday 6th June). Unlike previous commemorations, there are no plans for a massive bonfire by the Church. Instead, home made lanterns will play a key role, and both the school and village pub have already been signed up! They stressed that it was a community event, involving the Wharf as well as the Village, and agreed to our suggestion to make a similar presentation to Padworth PC. We agreed it was a worthy cause, and happily agreed to:

Let our name be used in official correspondence Ensure our insurance would cover events Provide up to £100 funding for materials etc.

Also in Open Forum we were asked about the status of the new Planning Application by Easy Concrete for the Woodyard on Paice's Hill. We were advised by our Chairman that it had been received by WBC, but they were still verifying it and had not released it for general comment. She was concerned that the land to the immediate south on their site could be used for storage, and was disappointed with the apparent support for this proposal by WBC Planning Enforcement, who seemed not take into account the historic use of the field

We agreed the appointment of a new Clerk to replace Des Farndell, though he cannot be identified till he has accepted the proposed terms of work. Hopefully this will have become clearer by the time you read this Report!

On the Planning front, we had two new Applications. A revised Application for a major development at Burnt Pine, Reading Road and an out-of-area one for Tadley Horizon School, Tadley Common. With regard the former our Clerk read out a letter he had received from the Applicant. We agreed the design was more appropriate than the last Application (which had been Approved) and on the basis that there had been no adverse reaction from neighbours, we agreed to repeat our position of **No Objection.** On the latter, we chose **not to comment**.


Since our last meeting, there have been no Planning decisions by WBC.

We agreed that Triangle should be awarded our grass-cutting contract. Theirs was not the cheapest quote, but had the benefit of being a Contractor we had used before.

We watched, with interest, the WBC Area Planning decision to approve the revised accommodation arrangements at the WBC-owned Four Houses Corner Traveler's Site in Ufton Nervet, as failure to do so would have increased the pressure on our own site. We will comment accordingly on the WBC Local Plan



LONDON UNLOCK WALK 41 Saturday 27 April 2024

Pat Owen (Beenham) Jean Chapman (Aldermaston) and myself are taking part in the Unlock Walk around Kensington, Chelsea, Hammersmith and Fulham on 27 April. We have taken part in this walk, which is a sponsored event for the past several years.

Unlock works by running local projects in UK cities where a trained Unlock Development Worker, accompanied by a local team is employed to encourage and enable local people and their leaders to grow in faith and confidence.

The aims of the Unlock Walk London are:

"Killer Crayfish" Established in the Kennet

I came to live in Berkshire from my home in Bayeux in France over 12 years ago, immediately fell in love with the Kennet and have recently established the Office of the Berkshire Action Campaign for the Kennet. So it is with dismay that I must report that "killer crayfish" have now been reported to be present in the Kennet. This follows reports from several other water courses such as the Test and as far north as the Whitham.

This is a result of misguided unofficial attempts to reintroduce the European crayfish (*Astacus astacus*) into waters infested by the American signal crayfish (*Pasificastacus leniusculus*), an invasive escapee from crayfish farms in the 1960s that has overtaken most waters in the UK, except for some areas in Scotland. Interbreeding has led to a cross that has the size and aggression of the signal crayfish, combined with the co-operative hunting of the European crayfish. Sadly, the reintroduced European crayfish do not survive as they are rapidly exterminated by the American crayfish or fall foul to a mould carried by it from which it is immune. Thus, the cross—progeny only come from female American crayfish that mate with, and then devour, the male European crayfish in much the same way as happens with spiders.

Reports from horrified eyewitnesses at other waters describe "piranha-like" frenzied attacks on ducklings and waterfowl as large as adult moorhens and coots, as shoals of these killer crayfish work in unison to hunt down their hapless prey. Moreover, there have been two incidences (Wye and Test) of dogs suffering serious lacerations when playing in those rivers. Furthermore, large fish such as chub and pike found dead with extensive amounts of flesh missing have been ascribed to such attacks, as the wounds do not correspond to those inflicted by otter or mink. It is not impossible that small dogs, such as chihuahuas, could suffer fatally from these monsters as they are known to follow their prey onto the river bank. It appears that these group attacks are a response to vibrations in the water and it would seem prudent not to allow small children to paddle in the Kennet this summer, no matter how shallow the water or hot the weather.

As a result of a mutation in the AM–WiFi–FM gene affecting the blood copper haemocyanin (Cu2Hc), killer crayfish turn blue on boiling instead of red, the reverse of lobsters. Identification in the wild, for fisherman who may accidentally catch one, can be based on the presence of a skull-like mark on the thorax akin to that of the death's head hawkmoth (Acherontia atropos). I thank Mr William E. Lyre for this information.

I would be grateful for any observations of such aggressive activity in the Kennet to be reported to the office of the Berkshire Action Campaign for the Kennet at a.bouffon@back-off.com.ic. In the meantime, please continue to enjoy the Kennet, but stay safe and respect the water and the lurking menace that lies within. Remember, the American killer crayfish are oversized, over sexed and over here.
