Notes from Beenham Parish Council meeting-Monday October 6th

Public Forum - No comments or questions.

Councillors

Community Room Toilet signage - It was agreed to remove the gender neutral signs.

Library Service update - The location of the proposed pop up library was discussed. Two locations were proposed: The Victory Hall or the Community Bookshelf. Neither are ideal. WBC to offer more explanation.

Affordable Housing initiative update -The PC is now ready to approach the landowners of the sites suggested by WBC Planning.

Planning Matters

25/01916/LBC: 12 Abbey Gardens, Woolhampton. Additional secondary glazing-No objection.

25/02119/HOUSE: 27 Mallard Way, Aldermaston. Single storey extension- No objection.

25/01434/CERTE: Storage, Pips Way, Beenham. Granted.

25/01890/FUL: Land North of Bath Road Woolhampton and West of Cods Hill, Reading - Change of use of land. Although this application is just outside Beenham Parish boundary, Cllr Chris Read, District Councillor for WBC Bucklebury Ward attended to bring this matter to our attention. He advised that the application is strongly opposed by neighbouring Parishes on the basis of safety, traffic and its location within an AONB. After lengthy discussion Beenham PC agreed to send its own views.

Councillor reports

Update on the 20mph speed limit in the vicinity of the School - Cllr Chris Read advised that a WBC policy on such limits should be available soon, and that WBC was compiling a list of applications from PCs for consideration and it is hoped that Beenham will be listed.

The next meeting will be held on **Monday November 3rd** at 7.00pm in the Community Room.

Hello to you from Greyfield Wood!

I am pleased to report that the clearing of the Ash wood debris, in preparation for planting, is going well and we expect to have this completed by the time you are reading this!

The next tasks for our merry band of volunteers from the village and the "Green Gym" volunteers is to clear the brambles and ensure that any ditches are cleared to allow for rain water to drain.

For regulars in the wood, you will notice that some stakes have already been positioned. These, which will be marked with white paint, are showing where naturally regenerated trees are growing. These will be mainly Beech or Hazel. These will be protected and allow to grow in with the saplings we hope to plant in December and January.

In the background the Directors are finalising the planting and ordering of the circa 1000 saplings and protectors! It will be another busy month of activity in Greyfield Wood.

BEENHAM PRE-SCHOOL


The last few weeks have been full of stories at Beenham Pre-School. We have been using story sacks and puppets to add excitement to some familiar tales and then sharing lots of new books and opportunities to use our imaginations and create stories. Even our very youngest children have been sharing their ideas, and we have



been amazed by some of the stories they have imagined . One of our favourite games is "What's in the Box" which we have now extended to "What's in the Socks" and "Who's in the Box". This has really supported the children to work on their

listening and attention skills and also their problem solving as they listen to clues and try to work it out. This has

also led to some fun games exploring rhymes and rhyming pairs. We have really high expectations for our children, and they always exceed them when they show us what they can do!





Meeting about how valuable this approach can be ... which is really exciting and a chance for us, as a setting, to show off about our lovely provision! We put the child at the centre of everything and work closely with parents, guardians and families to make sure that every child knows they belong, and this is key to our approach and to having children who are settled and confident to explore and learn. Our Tapestry App is a fabulous opportunity for us all to share news and while we don't have computers and TVs for the children (we think they should be moving and exploring!) we do give the children opportunities to share their photos with their friends on Tapestry, which is a great way to get them communicating and sharing news.

We are currently full for 2025-26 but I am running tours for families who wish to join our waiting list or for those wanting to book a place from September 2026 onwards. Do get in touch if you would like a tour or if you would like to chat about what we can offer your child. Spaces do open throughout the year, so it is certainly worth joining the list!

We post lots of our resources and activities on Facebook which can be useful for prospective families but we also love to show people around in person either within teaching sessions or out of hours depending on need.

Brimpton News

HYDE END VINEYARD

For those that walk along Hyde End Lane, one cannot have failed to notice the

vineyard that was planted in 2022. It is seven acres with 15,000 vines, which once mature should produce 10-15,000 bottles of wine per year. It has been planted with the three classic grapes that make Champagne or in our case English Sparkling Wine. These are Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier. In addition, there is Pinot Precoce, an early flowering red Pinot, and Bacchus, which has successfully produced still white in the UK.



On Sunday, the 28 September, the harvest took place with nearly 40 locals from around Brimpton and beyond joining to help. 2025 has seen the most sun on record which has

meant a very good year for UK grapes. Sugars have been high although yields have been low due to the lack of rain. It has also meant a very early harvest with Hyde End Vineyard three weeks ahead of our harvest last year.

In all, we picked nearly 3 tonnes of grapes which will produce nearly 700 bottles of still rosé and about 2000 bottles of white English sparkling. The grapes were shipped to Litmus Wines at Denbies Wine Estate near Guildford for the production. After the harvest, we all enjoyed lunch in the barn and of course some English white wine (as well as some French red!).

On a few evenings in the summer, a variety of locals do come to help with the management of the vineyard. A social event that is followed by drinks and maybe a BBQ. Midgham News

Organ Recital at St Matthew's Midgham by Gill Blythman on Friday 19th September

About 60 people came to St Matthew's Midgham on the evening of Friday 19th September to hear an excellent organ recital by Gill Blythman. Gill, who used to play regularly for services at St Matthew's, has recently become the organist of St Mary's Thatcham where the three-manual Gray and Davison organ is in need of substantial restoration. The Midgham PCC kindly agreed to support St Mary's by donating the takings for



the evening to their restoration fund. The high attendance was partly due to welcome support from the church community of St Mary's.

Gill's programme included little of the standard organ repertoire. Instead she chose pieces which showed off the variety of sounds available form this little organ, and were a delight to hear. However, she started with the Prelude, Fugue and Chaconne in C Major by Buxtehude which opens with a fearsome pedal solo on full organ. Buxtehude was a significant influence on the young JS Bach and this piece probably did have done just that.

Gill continued with a gentle piece by CV Stanford, his Andante Tranquillo before introducing us to the nineteenth century French composer Lefébure-Wély whose music often has a fairground-organ feel. This piece however, "Elevation" began with a haunting tune before modulating to something more optimistic.


The programme continued with JS Bach's Concerto in A minor, a Vivaldiesque piece which may have been written by Vivaldi and transcribed for organ by Bach. The baroque era was further represented later by a chorale by Georg Böhm, Nun bitten wir den Heilgen Geist. Sandwiching that we had three pieces by Scandinavian composers Egil Hovland, with a variation on "Now thank we all our God" and two pieces by the contemporary composer Mons Liedvin Takle, his Flute of Grace", which showed off the Midgham organ's flute stops beautifully, and his "Hymn to Freedom", a jazz acknowledgement of Oscar Petersen's theme of the same name. It had the audience tapping their feet, knowing they were listening to a piece that they won't normally hear as an organ voluntary on a Sunday.

The evening ended with delicious home-made refreshments and our thanks go to those who prepared them, as it does to Gill for entertaining us so finely.

VILLAGE SHOP

There was alarm in Woolhampton at the prospect of losing our village shop forever, so brothers Harry and DK were met with a warm welcome when they re-opened the shop recently, offering an extraordinary range of every-day necessities. For approaching a century, the shop has been an important village hub. Many villagers value it as a place to bump into their neighbours, as well as buying essentials. It is also well-known to people travelling along the A4.

I enjoyed an "armchair view" of life in the new shop one Sunday morning in October, when DK took the time to tell me about the brothers' aspirations. "We want the shop to be a good business that serves the community for the longer run," he told me. From my seat behind the counter, I witnessed villagers' enthusiasm for the new shop and the brothers' warm welcome. It was evident that they are getting to know their customers; "Those are not gluten-free," DK said to one regular.

I wondered how things were going. "We're not yet fully stocked. I hate it for customers to come looking for something and leave empty -handed. We can't stock everything, but we can get most things within 24 hours." They have recently gained their license to sell alcohol, a coffee machine is coming, and they hope to offer more fresh produce in time. They welcome local products, currently offering Woolhampton honey and handmade cards by Jenny Campbell and her daughter.

I asked him how villagers can support the shop. "We want to get to know you and to hear what you want," he said and showed me a juice he stocks for one regular customer. "It also helps us if you spread the word by telling people about us and 'liking' us on our Facebook page, which is coming soon".

NATURE NOTES



There seem to be far fewer squirrels around. I have not seen one for some time and have actually had some ripe nuts from my hazel. Is this because the population has dipped, or because there is so much bounty in the woods for them that they are not bothering to search further afield? Beech trees are shedding their 'mast' but I have not

yet seen any full beech nuts, so either they are not doing as well as other trees or they are hanging onto the mature nuts. Nobody can have missed that it is an abundant year for acorns. It is impossible to walk along the country pavements without treading on them and the missing squirrels may be indulging on them. They are indigestible to many animals, but others eat them



freely – such is nature. Mushrooms and fungi {the same, really, only there are those you shouldn't eat!} are growing under the fallen leaves. Surprisingly Berkshire is one of the drier counties, but if we do get some rain there should be a toadstool burgeoning by the end of November.

Ladybirds are beginning to invade buildings — be kind to them — but as I write, halfway through October, there are still butterflies on the ivy.



Cars, Garages & Bristol



During the 1920s the increase in the number of motor vehicles led to the establishment of garages able to provide the appropriate services. (Vehicles on the road had risen from 398,000 in 1914 to 1,500,000 by 1928.) Purposebuilt accommodation for a car was provided for some houses in the years prior to the 1914-18 war and referred to variously as 'motor shed', 'motor den' or 'motory'. The first bulk storage filling station was opened in 1920 on the Bath Road, Aldermaston, by the AA. The service provided hand-pumped 'National Benzole' petrol; also available was water for radiators, a compressor for inflating tyres, a fire extinguisher and, for members only, the use of a telephone.

Inspired by this, the Maynard brothers Cyril and Leonard, their father being electrician for the Woolhampton estate, applied in 1920 for permission to open a workshop on estate land on the site of the present BP service station. The brothers advertised themselves as providing vehicle repairs and a car and charabanc on hire service on Woolhampton Tel: 25. There was competition from the 'Angel' where 'Pratt's' motor spirit was available in cans and the 'Scarlet Runner' was a rival charabanc service.

Shock! On a January morning in 1926 it was discovered that the Maynard's garage had been burgled and all stock to value of £196 had been stolen. The culprits were arrested in Bristol. Thieves were now mobile! The incident led to the addition of an Alsatian dog and a bungalow on the site of the garage


