Latterly the Common was a Royal Air Force station in 1942 and used by the US Air Force during World War II and the Cold War. It became notable for the Greenham Common Women's Peace Camp, which protested against the stationing of nuclear missiles from 1981 until the base's closure in 1992, after which it was transformed into public parkland.

Happy New Year to stallholders, and everyone attending our monthly Village Market. New Year, new resolutions and what else? If you're new to the village, did you know there is a monthly market held in the Village Hall? Why not pop along to find out what it's all about. You're sure to find a friendly welcome and it's an ideal opportunity to perhaps meet your neighbours.

The first Market of 2026 will be on Saturday 7th February from 10am to 12noon in the Village Hall. Here's hoping the weather will be kind for this community event but you are always assured of a warm (and dry!) welcome.

There is a wide variety of stalls selling cakes, books, knitted articles, jewellery, needlework, jars & vases, wood craft, local history books, honey, bird food and much more. There is no entry charge and refreshments (including hot bacon rolls) are available.



Recycling Reminder: if you have **used postage stamps** (e.g. from Christmas cards, etc.), the Air Ambulance charity stall will take them; if you have **used printer ink cartridges** or **unwanted clothes**, shoes, etc., please bring them along to the Market and we will arrange for them to be distributed to our local school; or if you have a collection of unwanted **milk bottle tops**, the pet food stall will be pleased to take them for charity.

Candles for Ukraine.

Were you aware of the collection of unwanted new (and part-used) candles for the people of Ukraine? Waitrose (Thatcham) has a collection point but if you can't get them to Thatcham, please bring them along to the Market and we will get them there.

District Councillor's Surgery in Woolhampton Village Hall

After holding successful surgeries on the last Saturday of the month during the past year, our District Councillor, Mr Chris Read, intends to continue with them during 2026, starting on Saturday 31st January from 9 to 11a.m. Thereafter on the last Saturday of each month at the same time (the second one being on Saturday 28th February). He welcomes interaction from local residents about issues of concern for our parish and environment.

Woolhampton Annual Show 2026

This is the 25th year of this Village event. The Show is held in the Village Hall and there are classes for cookery, flowers, vegetable, photography, handicraft, etc., with specific classes for children. (Reminder: if you intend entering the Preserves class, now is the time to make marmalade as Seville oranges are readily available.) With the demographic of the village changing and younger families moving in to the area, it is an ideal opportunity to get involved and, just as importantly, get children involved in village life. This year's Show is scheduled for Saturday 15th August (please make a note in your diaries **now**) so there is plenty of time to consider what flowers, fruit and vegetables you will grow to make sure that your entries are winning ones. Also, in the next *Villages' News*, we should be able to publish the photographic classes, thus giving you plenty of time to get your cameras ready for action.

Two competitions that will definitely feature again are:

a) Potato-growing-in-a-container

For new residents in the village, or indeed anyone who fancies having a go, this involves buying 3 seed potatoes from a member of Show Committee, planting them in a large(ish) container, tub, pot, etc., then bringing that container, intact, to the Village Hall on date of the Show in August. Please note that only potatoes purchased this way are eligible, and also please remember that you have to get the container to Village Hall (planting them in a skip won't work!).

At the Hall, your container is tipped out, the potatoes weighed, and the highest yield wins and everyone keeps their potatoes.

Potatoes will be ready in March so if you are interested, please contact Terry (email terry.vallis@outlook.com soon). In light of last year's high number of entries, early response is required in order that you will not be disappointed.



b) Tallest sunflower

This year you can again select your own species to grow.

There will be monthly bulletins on Woolhampton facebook pages and in the *Villages' News* magazine. If you have any queries, please contact Cathy on 01189713637. The tallest sunflower, anticipated to be between 9 and 15 feet (approx. 3-5 metres), will be adjudged the winner. Plants will be judged in situ by invitation to the Show Committee in early-August. (plants are not intended to be brought to Village Hall!).



1784 John Palmer and the Royal Mail

'Reading Mercury' 25th July 1784

"On Monday next the experiment of the more expeditious conveyance of the mail will be made on the road from London to Bristol, the letters to be posted in London office every evening before seven and to arrive in Bristol the next day at twelve".

The established route was served by a relay of post-boys maintaining a speed of 3-5 mph. Thus mail leaving Bristol at 10pm on Monday did not arrive in London until 3pm on Wednesday - stage coach travelling through the night only took 13 hours.

John Palmer owned theatres in Bath and Bristol and was familiar with travel by road needing to move actors and props between venues. Newspapers were transported swiftly by stage coach at this time, but the apathetic post office persisted with post-boys. Palmer had also noticed that post houses kept the slower horses for the mail. Through the good offices of Lord Camden, William Pitt the Younger (then Chancellor of the Exchequer), agreed to test Palmer's proposal. This was conducted on 1st to 2nd August on the Great Bath Road, London to Bristol, passing through Woolhampton, a well surfaced and turnpiked highway with inns suitable to provide changes of horses at suitable stages. Ed Fromont of the 'Kings Head', Thatcham, was so chosen and on this critical night in 1784 a stagecoach departed with both mail and passengers. The Bristol bound coach left London and was due to arrive at Thatcham at 2.45 am, change horses to resume journey to be off by 3 05 am. The coach and passenger (fare 28 shillings) plus strong box and guard armed with pistols and blunderbuss, allowed to ignore turnpike gates, completed the journey in 13 hours. *"It has been truly astonishing"* (*Bath Chronicle*) Speed and security were paramount thus attracting paying customers. In 1792 16 post coaches left London daily and there were 15 cross-country coaches, e.g. Bristol to Oxford. Daniel Defoe in 1721 remarked on the narrowness of the road at Woolhampton, hence the road widening of 1931 and the demolition of the brewery, the old 'Angel' inn and the post office.

Blue tits and great tits are coming to the feeders, with the occasional coal tit and a little family of long-tailed tits visited some old seed heads I had left on the flowers, but not even pigeons have eaten any ivy berries. So not a sight of any visitors like fieldfares, redwings or waxwings – if you've seen any you are very lucky!



So what will this year bring? Will it be a shortage of all the fruit that has been abundant this year – with maybe a sharp autumn so all the holly berries are eaten before Christmas? Whatever comes, have a happy and healthy New Year.

19 Notes from Beenham Parish Council meeting 5th January 2026

Public Forum

-The WI recovered 15 empty 1l bottles of vodka in a small area in their recent litter pick. TVP are to be notified.

-SVG (Sovereign Housing) have sold another potentially affordable house in Beenham. The PC have raised this with West Berks and our local MP.

Councillors

-As a result of the vandalism incident at the school, a CCTV day/night surveillance system was discussed. After a field meeting with the school/PC, the suggestion will be discussed at the next meeting.

-Affordable housing initiative: The PC is still talking to potential landowners.

Planning Matters

-25/02742/HOUSE. Woodside, Clay Lane, Beenham, RG7 5PG. side extension and loft extension. The PC had no objection and left it to neighbours for comment.

-25/02784/HOUSE. Highdown, Webbs Lane, Beenham, RG7 5LH. 1st floor roof extension. The PC had no objection and left it to neighbours for comment if necessary.

Planning decisions

- Granted. 25/02231/FULMAJ. Land to the East along Pips Way.

Parish Councillors

-Litter bins/grass cutting tender. Tenders for these services are to be sought to ensure we are getting competitive rates. (post meeting note...this may also be for the maintenance of the salt bins).

-20 mph speed limit through Beenham. WBC has a programme of introducing a 20mph speed limit where appropriate in all villages (after local consultation). This will take several years, and Beenham is in the plan for 2027-2028. The PC is going to continue to determine what restrictions parishioners would like, and to liaise with WBC.

Financial Matters.

- Two Grant requests have been received.

-WI: £400 for litter picking. Approved

-St Marys Church: £800 for churchyard maintenance. Approved.

-2026/27 PC precept. It was agreed to increase the proposed precept to £21320 which is an approximately 10% increase since the last review in 2023.

Greyfield Wood Villages' Magazine – February 2026



Hello and Happy New Year to you from Greyfield Wood!

So, we are now well into 2026 and another year of work lies ahead in the wood.

We have achieved our 2025 goal of replanting where we felled the Ash and Norwegian Spruce. Many thanks to our volunteers who gave of their time. I am pleased to say that we planted over 1000 saplings, which is more than we originally felled!

One of our main activities going forward will be to ensure that the new saplings are monitored for damage caused by deer. Although each sapling has a protector, deer can still disturb the saplings, so damage remediation is a constant requirement to ensure they can mature in the coming years.

We will also be replenishing our cordwood stock from remaining felled wood. This needs to be done prior to the bird nesting season. There will also be paths and drainage ditches to be cleared, so another busy year is in store.

In December John Newton stepped down from the Board after many years being part of the management team. He will still be around working in the wood, but the Board will miss his attention to detail in many areas and his work on managing the Volunteer groups and sorting out insurances.....Thank you John!

A date for your diary. Our Open day in the wood this year will be held on Sunday 7th June from 2pm.
